	Spelling – We use Phonics Bug scheme to teach our pupils the phonemes and				
	graphemes they need to spell words.				
	The children learn to write common exception words that the children cannot				
	solely use their phonic knowledge to segment.				
	They begin to add prefixes and suffixes including un, ing, es, ed, er and est.				
	<u>Punctuation</u> – We teach pupils punctuation rules to then transfer into writing				
	lessons, so that children feel confident with applying a range of punctuation. This includes sentence structure, spaces between words, full stops, capital				
	letters, question marks and exclamation marks.				
	Reading – studying a range of texts through whole class study, guided				
	reading and individual reading. Building skills in the areas of:				
	- Decoding words using phonic knowledge.
